A school-parent compact is an agreement that explains how parents, teachers and students will work together to make sure all students reach grade-level standards. This compact provides strategies to help connect learning at school and at home.

Effective compacts:

- Link to academic achievement goals
- Focus on student learning
- Share strategies that staff, parents and students can use
- Explain how parents and teachers can communicate about student progress
- Describe opportunities for parents to observe, volunteer and participate at school

Jointly Developed

Shared decision making is a collaborative process that allows parents, the school and community to make decisions together. The parents, students, and faculty of Parkwood Elementary School partnered together to develop this compact for achievement.

Parents and students are encouraged to attend the Shared Decision Making Meeting each spring to review the compact and make suggestions based on student needs and school improvement goals. Roundtable discussions and feedback cards are the methods used for gathering input.

- ◆ Conduct Academic Events focusing on reading skills, reading comprehension, math fluency and problem solving being taught in the classroom.
- ◆ Provide families appropriate texts for individual students to improve fluency and questions to improve comprehension.

Families will...

- ◆ Practice math facts with their student using teacher recommended online resources and strategy based math activities for addition and subtraction.
- ◆ Attend Academic Events focusing on reading skills, reading comprehension, math fluency and problem solving being taught in the classroom.
- ◆ Listen to their student read from their appropriate level text and ask questions provided.

Students will...

- ◆ Practice Math skills nightly by using online resources and strategy based learning centers (games).
- ◆ Remind their parents about Academic Events.
- ◆ Read from their individual text nightly and answer comprehension questions.
