Do you recall what it felt like when you made a big play for your school football team, playing street football, or even on a video game? Do you remember what it felt like when you changed that flat tire, landed your first job, or got a smile from the girl you liked? Do you remember how you felt when your child stood up by himself for the first time or said dada?

In this month of February, as many prepare to cherish their loved ones, I want to remind us to take time to relish and celebrate the small victories, not only in our children's lives, but ours as well. It is important that we praise our children and encourage their efforts on a weekly or monthly basis. I believe it is also equally important to celebrate our own small victories; to take stock in how far we have come in being a man, a dad, a person.

Last week, I experienced a small victory that did not seem much like a victory at that time. It was a Monday night and my truck had stopped running 3 days prior. I added more gas to it and nothing. We tried to jump start it and it did not start either. I thought I would push the truck back up in the driveway to park my other vehicle behind it. As I put the truck in neutral, instead of me pushing the truck up in the driveway, gravity and the truck decided to push me back into the street a bit. After the truck stopped I tried to push it again. I pushed once and it moved. I pushed twice and it begin to go further. I pushed one last time and VIC-TORY. It moved up just enough to let me know it was possible, but that I could not do it on my own. After looking for help in the dark night in my neighborhood, I reluctantly asked my wife for help. Together, we were

able to get over the bump and incline I could not do alone. In the mist of pushing alone, by myself, with all my might, <u>what felt</u> <u>like a losing effort was</u> <u>truly a victory</u>.
