#### **NMPS Hosts Open Forum**

On January 14, Interim Superintendent Alisha DiCorpo hosted an Open Forum for parents and community members via Zoom. The purpose was to discuss how the group can collectively support families in New Milford through this challenging school year, while students have been in the hybrid model of instruction and continuing learning when remote instruction has been necessary. DiCorpo was joined on the call by all five school principals, the Pupil Services Director, Technology Director, other Central Office and building administrators and community organization representatives. Ms. DiCorpo encouraged callers to share their feedback about their struggles and successes to help the district plan for the remainder of the year and beyond.

Callers praised district teachers and supporting staff for their hard work and extra effort, saying they are doing their very best in a difficult situation, but talked about the stresses on families as they try to juggle hybrid and sometimes remote learning. They long for a return to full in person school.

Ms. DiCorpo said she meets weekly with the Director of Health, District Medical Advisor, school nurses and others to review current metrics for the Town of New Milford and of those in surrounding towns. She said the district has proactively used mitigation strategies around holiday breaks to try to keep schools open. They have made a concerted effort to increase substitute coverage so there is sufficient staffing. She said she understood how challenging this has been for all stakeholders, with some tough months still to come, but a vaccine on the horizon finally.

Looking to the future, Ms. DiCorpo said that district administrators have been collaboratively planning over the last month or so on the timing to bring back students to full in person learning in the early spring. At the same time, students who are accessing their education remotely will continue to be able to do so if parents wish. The initial goal is to bring back students PK-2 all in person under a four and one half day schedule. First, transition protocols must be developed to ensure a safe and smooth return. This includes internal planning and funding of needed materials, such as additional partitions and air purifiers; staff input and feedback; as well as a parent survey as to intent to return. Once the PK-2 group is established, the district will look to return grades 3-5 to in person learning as the next group shortly after. Ms. DiCorpo said they are exploring possibilities for the middle and high school as well. As we continue to work through the process, updates will be provided.

### Parent Partnership Initiative: Caregiver Mondays



On select Mondays October through February, our Elementary and Middle School instructional coaches are providing opportunities for caregivers to learn about specific elements of instruction. Each meeting runs for approximately twenty minutes per grade level on select Mondays for grades K-8. Topics focus on information that is timely and relevant to the learning taking place in your child's classroom, whether he or she is in person or participating in learning remotely. So far, eight sessions have been held. Session recordings can be found here:



## Schaghticoke Middle School



The SMS Talented and Gifted (TAG) department was happy to host Dr. Shelly Jones, Associate Professor of Mathematics Education at Central Connecticut State University (CCSU), for a series of online mathematical presentations on January 20 for ALL SMS students as well as SNIS TAG students. TAG teacher Linda Santoro organized this opportunity for students.

Dr. Jones has been an educator for 25 years teaching at the middle school, high school and collegiate levels. She has served her community by working on various committees at the Connecticut State Department of Education and presenting at conferences at the local (Associated Teachers of Mathematics in Connecticut – ATOMIC), regional (Benjamin Banneker Association) and national (National Council of Teachers of Mathematics: NCTM) level. She recently authored the book, *Women Who Count: Honoring African American Women Mathematicians*. The book highlights the lives and work of 29 African American women mathematicians, including Dr. Christine Darden, Mary Jackson, Katherine Johnson, and Dorothy Vaughan from the award-winning book and movie *Hidden Figures*.

During the presentations, students heard about African American women mathematicians and then were invited to participate in an interactive math activity. Topics differed by grade level and included magic squares, Euler paths and circuits, tessellations and transformations and palindrome numbers. The presentation took the place of other regular school classes or activities, much like an assembly would if students were all in school in person.

The John J. McCarthy Observatory opened its doors to the public in December 2000 and has been a valuable resource in our district over the last twenty years. The observatory volunteers have collaborated with NMHS faculty, providing unique experiences to our

students that students in other parts of the state don't have access to. Here are some of the highlights from the last ten years:

- Independent Student Research Projects (quasars, astrophotography, comets, etc.)
- 9th Grade Science Class Field Trips
- English Class Field Trips (The Odyssey)
- Collaboration with PLTW Classes (projects, mentorships, etc.)
- Chorus and All School Musical Collaboration (incorporation of JJMO images)
- Planned Collaboration with Plant Science Classes (Galileo's Garden)

New Milford is very fortunate to have an operating astronomical observatory that is open to the public with volunteers who will go above and beyond to support science education for all of our students and the broader New Milford community. This year has been a particular challenge, but JJMO continues to move forward with new initiatives and programs and we all look forward to the day (hopefully soon) when it can open its doors again. # New Milford Adult Education Advances in Competition

On January 12, 2021, the U.S. Department of Education announced 95 finalists in the Rethink Adult Ed Challenge, a \$750,000 competition to advance pre-apprenticeships. These finalists include the New Milford Adult Education Program! Finalists hail from 32 states and two territories, and include higher education institutions, local educational agencies, community and faith-based organizations, and correctional facilities.

Although apprenticeships serve as a pathway into careers across industries, many adult learners face barriers to accessing them. Pre-apprenticeships break down these barriers by equipping adult learners with the knowledge and skills they need to enter and succeed in apprenticeships — which can expand access to rewarding careers across the United States.

The Stage 2 virtual accelerator will run from February to June 2021. Finalists will have
access to a range of digital resources — such as case studies, activities, and webinars
with subject matter experts — to help them develop detailed program proposals. A
judging panel will review the Stage 2 proposals and select one grand-prize winner and
up to five runners-up. The challenge will award \$250,000 to the grand-prize winner,
and up to five runners-up will each receive at least \$100,000. Good luck New Milford!

## BOE Adopts 2021-22 Education Budget



New Milford Public Schools Interim Superintendent Alisha DiCorpo and administrative team members presented the proposed 2021-22 education budget to the New Milford Board of Education for consideration on the evenings of January 19, 20, 26 and 27 in public session. The 2021-22 Superintendent's Budget, as proposed, was \$66,096,024 which is an increase of \$1,631,248 or 2.53% over the current year's budget.

Ms. DiCorpo states, "This proposed budget is the result of collaborative effort with District administrators and building principals. The request supports specific needs and increases in costs in our Special Education budget as well as contracted services in the Department of Pupil Personnel and Support Services, includes an allocation for Middle School and High School summer programming, adds a 0.5 Guidance Counselor at Sarah Noble Intermediate School, as well as maintains class sizes to support small group and individualized instruction. It also continues the District's focus on instructional improvement, allows the district to continue to upgrade the Student Information System, as well as additional costs related to one to one student devices and continued school safety. As always, the District has worked hard to prioritize initiatives, find efficiencies, and reallocate resources in order to continue improving the education we provide to students, while maintaining a fiscally conservative and responsible budget proposal."

Over the course of several nights, the Board heard detailed presentations regarding each of our five schools from PK-Grade 12; and from the departments of Instruction, Pupil Personnel/Special Education, General Administration which includes the Business Office and Human Resources, Facilities and Technology. Public comment was offered each evening.

The Board of Education's Adopted budget, as approved on January 27, 2021, was finalized at \$65,846,024, which represents a 2.14% increase over the current year's budget. The reduction of \$250,000 from the Superintendent's proposal was recommended by Board Chairperson Wendy Faulenbach, and approved by the full Board, as an offset from the Internal Service Fund. "This offset from the health insurance reserve account has been endorsed by the Town," said Mrs. Faulenbach, "and provides fiscal relief without touching any programs."

Budget documents and video recordings of the four evenings of presentations and deliberations can be found under the Budget tab on the district website <u>here</u>.

Board of Education Chairperson Wendy Faulenbach says, "The budget process is extremely difficult and time consuming for all involved. The entire Board and district recognize their responsibility and take this charge very seriously. The Board worked diligently through adoption to put forward a fiscally conservative request while balancing the needs of instruction and programs. Hard choices continue to be made. The Board appreciates the engagement of the community continuing through this process as it moves through the Town Council and Board of Finance. The Board hopes the budget will be supported as presented."
