Educators Attend Move On When Ready Training



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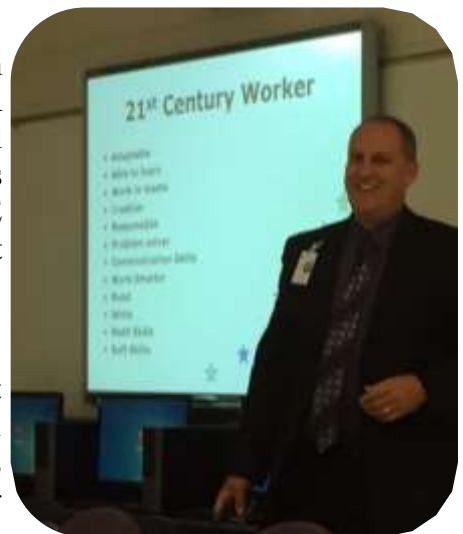
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Move On When Ready (MOWR) is Georgia's new dual enrollment program that allows high school students to earn college credit while working on their high school diplomas.

The new law streamlines the existing dual enrollment options into one program with one funding source. By consolidating the existing programs into a single program, it will be easier for students and parents to navigate and take advantage of the available options to enroll in college courses while still in high school. The new MOWR program includes provisions to help remove some of the financial barriers that may prevent students from participating in a dual enrollment program. The new MOWR was signed into law on April 30, 2015 and went into effect on July 1, 2015. The new MOWR program is administered by the Georgia Student Finance Commission.

MOWR Training was held at the Macon Centreplex on July 30 to provide new MOWR (Senate Bill 132/Senate Bill 2) information. All high school counselors attended the training as well as David McDermott, Director of CTAE and Kathy James, Coordinator for Student Services.

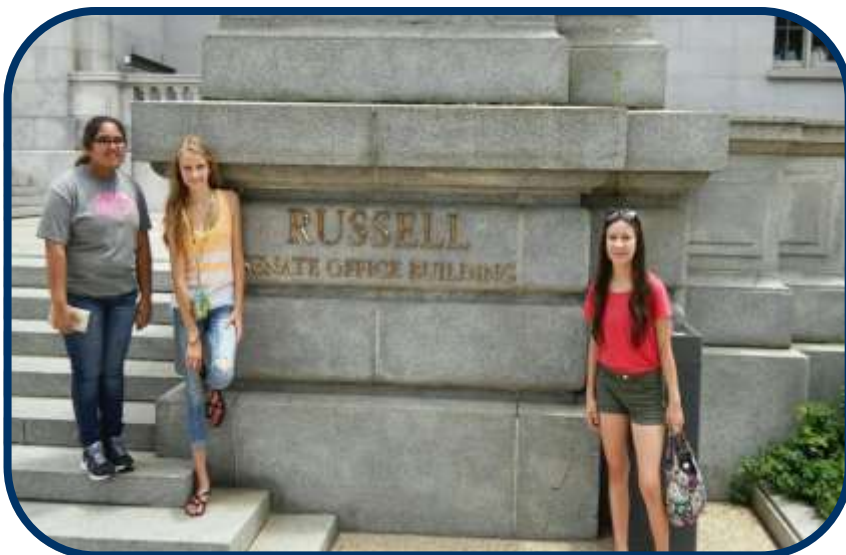
FMMS FCCLA Brings Home Awards

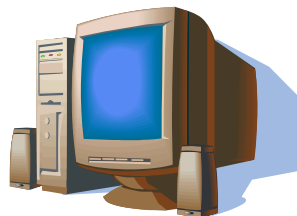

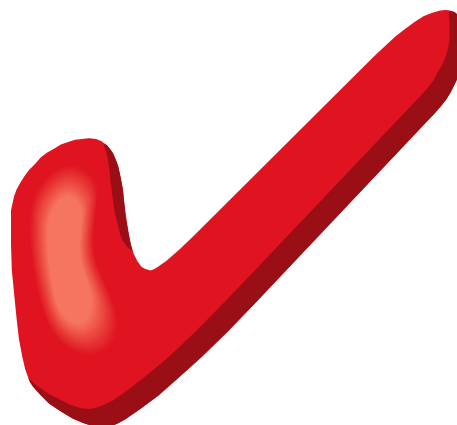

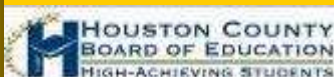
