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



Achievement Testing is given on an alternating-year schedule to students in grades K-9 at MLC. Due to distance learning last spring, however, we were unable to test. This year, all students in Kindergarten through 9th grade will participate in Terra Nova Assessments through ACSI. Students will test the week of April 12 (this is a change from the last Bear Facts).

Terra Nova testing is a reliable, standardized tool used for the purpose of tracking student progress. These tests measure mastery in reading, language arts, mathematics, science, social studies, vocabulary, spelling and other areas. Test results are used to identify strengths and weaknesses in student performance and help to highlight any gaps in curriculum.


