ESSER III Use of Funds Plan

American Rescue Plan (ARP) Act

Introduction

The American Rescue Plan (ARP) Act statute requires that LEAs develop and make publicly available their plans for the use of funds after having engaged in meaningful consultation with stakeholders. This plan must be reviewed and revised every six months. A summary of plans for Lohn ISD ESSER III funding, aligned to four required components, is below.

Public Comment & Stakeholder Input

This plan was developed in consultation with stakeholders after soliciting public comment via electronic survey, public board meeting, a focus group meeting, and consultation with individual stakeholders.

Effective Date & Publication of Plan

The plan was written on July 9, 2021, and posted to the LEA website lohnisd.net Should revisions to the plan become necessary, the plan will be updated and a revised version posted on the website.

Required Components of Use of Funds Plan

Statute requires that LEAs describe its use of funds according to four components:

- 1. Prevention and mitigation strategies consistent to the latest CDC guidance on reopening schools in order to continuously and safely open and operate schools for in-person learning. (LEAs are not required to use ESSER III funds for this activity.)
- 2. How LEA will use funds to address the academic impact of lost instructional time through evidence-based interventions, such as summer learning or summer enrichment, extended day, comprehensive afterschool programs, or extended school year
- 3. How LEA will spend its remaining funds to meet the intent and purpose of ESSER III
- 4. How LEA will ensure the interventions address the academic impact of lost instructional time, will respond to the academic, social, emotional, and mental health needs of all students, and particularly those students disproportionately impacted by COVID19, including students from low-income families, students of color, English learners, children with disabilities, students experiencing homelessness, children in foster care, and migratory students.

Plan for Funding to Address Impact on Learning

Statute requires a minimum of 20% of ESSER III funding to be directed toward activities that address learning loss. This requirement is separated among two components:

- Component #2: Evidence-based interventions; and
- <u>Component #4</u>: Interventions that ensure the social, emotional, mental health needs of students are met

Lohn ISD plans to use 100% of the ESSER III funding to address Component #2 and Component #4.

Initial 2/3 Entitlement: \$156,929	20% of Entitlement: \$31,385.80 (minimum allowed)
Total (initial + final amts.) Entitlement: \$235,393	20% of Entitlement: \$47,078.60 (minimum allowed)
Amount Directed Toward Learning Loss: \$152,221	

Note: Both sections under the \geq 20% heading are required (learning loss and interventions for social, emotional, mental health). LEAs may spend up to 100% on these activities, if needed, but a minimum of 20% is required.

Component #2: Evidence-based Interventions

Lohn ISD will address learning loss through the following activities:

Summer learning; before/after school tutoring.

Lohn ISD will use ESSER III funding for payroll for teachers during summer school 2021, summer school 2022 and summer school 2023. Also, Lohn ISD will use ESSER III funds for payroll for teachers during before or after school tutoring during the 2021-22 and 2022-23 school year. Finally, ESSER III funds will be used to pay the contract with ESC Region 15 to receive enhanced technical ESSER assistance (2021-2024).

The LEA has budgeted to implement these activities during the following years:

- 3/13/20 preaward reimburse LEA for activities conducted prior to application submission
- 2020-2021 school year
- 2021-2022 school year
- 2022-2023 school year
- 2023-2024 school year (as carryover)

Some allowable uses of funds aligned to this component include –

- Activities aligned with ESEA
- Activities aligned with IDEA
- Activities aligned with Adult Education & Family Literacy Act (AEFLA)
- Activities aligned with Perkins CTE

- Purchase educational technology to aid educational interaction (students/teachers)
- Plan/implement summer learning & after-school programs
- Address learning loss (assessments; comprehensive needs of students; PFE support; tracking remote attendance/engagement)

Component #4: Interventions Addressing Academic, Social, Emotional Needs of Students

Lohn ISD will provide interventions responding academic, social, emotional, and mental health needs of all students, in particular underserved groups*, through the following activities:

Lohn ISD will provide support for students and staff by employing a full-time school counselor.

*<u>Underserved groups</u>: low-income students; students of color; English learners; students with disabilities; students experiencing homelessness; children in foster care; migratory students

The LEA has budgeted to implement these activities during the following years:

- 2021-2022 school year
- 2022-2023 school year
- 2023-2024 school year (as carryover)

Some allowable uses of funds aligned to this component include –

- Address student needs: low-income, children with disabilities, English learners, racial and ethnic minorities, students experiencing homelessness, and foster care youth
- Purchase educational technology to aid educational interaction (students/teachers)
- Provide mental health services and supports (incl. implementation of evidence-based full-service community schools & hiring counselors)
- Address learning loss (assessments; comprehensive needs of students; PFE support; tracking remote attendance/engagement)

Plan for Other Needs

Lohn ISD plans to NOT use ESSER III funds for either Component #1: Prevention and Mitigation Strategies, nor Component #3: Safely reopening and sustaining the safe operation of schools addressing the impact of the coronavirus pandemic on students.

Lohn ISD plans to use other funding sources (State funding, local funding, or other) to meet these needs.

Statute requires that the remaining funds (≤ 80% of ESSER III entitlement) be spent on other needs aligned with the intent and purpose of ESSER III. This requirement is separated among two components:

- Component #1: Prevention and Mitigation Strategies (optional use of ESSER III); and
- <u>Component #3</u>: Remaining use of ESSER funds aligned to safely reopening and sustaining the safe operation of schools and addressing the impact of the coronavirus pandemic on students

Initial 2/3 Entitlement: \$156,929	80% of Entitlement: \$125,543.20 (maximum allowed)
Total (initial + final amts.) Entitlement: \$	80% of Entitlement: \$(maximum allowed)
Amount Directed Toward Other Needs: \$0	

Note: Activities in this section are NOT required if 100% has been directed toward the learning loss and social/emotional/mental health category. If the LEA uses funds for "Other Needs" the strategies must be described below and clearly aligned to the intent and purpose of the program.

Component #1: Prevention and Mitigation Strategies

Lohn ISD will provide prevention and mitigation strategies consistent with CDC guidance (to the greatest extent possible) on reopening schools, in order to continuously and safely open and operate schools for in-person learning.

Lohn ISD is supporting these strategies through other funding sources.

Some allowable uses of funds aligned to this component include –

- Strategies/Protocols aligned to CDC guidance (reopening/operating)
- Coordinating to prevent, prepare for, respond to COVID19
- PD: sanitizing and minimizing the spread of infectious diseases
- Purchasing supplies to sanitize and clean
- Develop & implement procedures and systems to improve preparedness & response efforts of LEAs

Component #3: Remaining Use of Funds

Lohn ISD plans that there will be no ESSER III funds used to help safely reopen and sustain the safe operation of schools and address the impact of the coronavirus pandemic on students. Lohn ISD plans to use other funding sources to meet the needs of this section.

Some allowable uses of funds aligned to this component include –

- Repairing & improving school facilities to reduce risk of virus/exposure to health hazards
- Improving indoor air quality
- Develop & implement procedures and systems to improve preparedness & response efforts of LEAs
- Plan/implement activities during long-term closures, (meals to eligible students; provide technology for online learning; guidance for IDEA requirements; ensure other ed. services continue per federal, state, local requirements)
- Other activities that are necessary to maintain operation of and continuity of services, including continuing to employ existing or hiring new LEA and school staff
