How Physical Therapy works in a school system:

- Physical Therapy (PT) is a related service provided for a student to function in the educational setting.
- The need for PT is determined by the student's IEP team.
- Students may receive direct services by a Physical Therapist or through school staff working collaboratively with our PT team.
- PT can be provided in any location on school campus or in the home through virtual therapy.

## National Physical Therapy Month

Student Services Report - October 2020

National School Attendance Awareness Month is observed during the month of September. The campaign for 2020 is entitled Present, Engaged and Supported! The campaign is a state and national initiative aimed at promoting better policies and practices around school attendance.

Across the country, due to chronic absences, more than eight million students are considered to be at risk academically. Chronic absence is defined as missing 10 percent or greater of the total number of days enrolled during the school year for any reason. It includes both excused, unexcused, out-ofschool suspensions, and in-school suspensions that last more than one-half of the school day. These absences could manifest into a third grader's inability to master reading, a sixth grader not passing classes or a ninth-grader dropping out of high school. The Houston County Board of Education emphasizes the value of regular school attendance as essential to gaining a quality education.


During the Covid-19 pandemic, many students and families face even greater challenges with school attendance and may require a higher level of support. Social Services Department works in conjunction with the staff and administrators of all Houston County schools to identify students and families who experience barriers to regular school attendance, whether face to face or virtually, to provide additional support. School social workers can link families with community resources that facilitate elimination of social and economic issues that may lead to poor attendance. They also assist schools with planning awareness campaigns, spirit weeks and celebrations for students with improved attendance.

Many exciting things have happened over the last month in School Nutrition! On August 31, 2020, Secretary Sonny Perdue announced that the state would allow all children 18 years and under to receive their meals at no charge through December 31, 2020. Houston County School Nutrition has been hard at work providing meals to students in our school buildings, students enrolled in virtual learning, and children in our community. To accommodate the increase in meal participation, five additional pick up feeding sites have been added for a total of 13 sites in Houston County. Families picking up meals may come through any of our middle or high schools and receive 1 weeks' worth of meals! Participation has been steadily increasing, and this Wednesday (September 23rd), over 36,750 meals were served in our pick up lines alone!

The Houston County School Nutrition team is very grateful for the many school nutrition managers and food assistants that have made this opportunity a reality!
