

- The coaches are working with Kindergarten through 5th grade teachers during PLC's to learn about the "Science of Reading" as it applies to CKLA instructional practices and foundational skills.
- The coaches created Learning Box Activity Cards for students and families to use with the manipulatives included in the grade-level learning boxes.
- Teachers had the opportunity to earn In-Service credit by attending after-school virtual workshops on Best Practices for Virtual Learning, Interactive Technology Tools for the Classroom, and Strategies to Increase Complex Thinking in the Classroom.

School Nutrition

The Tennessee Department of Human Services (TDHS) is extending its Electronic Benefit Transfer (P-EBT) program into the fall semester by sending qualifying families a card they can use to buy food for their student who has been impacted by the pandemic.

P-EBT will provide parents with approximately \$5.86 in benefits per student for each school day that child missed because of the COVID-19 this is based on an average number of days established by the TDHS. The number of days varies based on if students are coded 100% Virtual or Hybrid. These benefits can be used to purchase food at any establishment that accepts EBT or online with Amazon and Walmart.

To be eligible, students must receive free or reduced meals at school or attend a Community Eligibility Provision (CEP)school, and they must have missed at least five consecutive days of in person instruction because of school closure or virtual learning. In Round 3,once qualified, the student is qualified for the remaining part of the school year.

SMHS Wrestling

The SMHS Panther wrestling season ended last month with 2 State qualifiers on the boys' team, 2 State qualifiers for the girls' team, and one State medalist. Junior Ryan King and Sophomore Aubrey Thompson both made it to the top 16 in their weight classes in the TSSAA State Tournament. Sophomore Jaelyn Patton and Senior Aaliyha Threet made it to the top 8 in the TSSAA Girls' State Tournament with Aaliyha actually taking the 4th place medal home to Crossville. It was a difficult season with cancellations due to COVID, but these young adults managed to fight through, rise to occasion, and make us proud.

Cumberland County Youth Wrestling

Cumberland County Youth Wrestling had a good season with over 40 kids participating in grades 4 through 8, from all the schools in the county. Many of our kids participated in our tournament at SMHS as well as some out-of-county tournaments. We expect that number to nearly double next year as COVID has less of an impact. Wrestling is great sport to teach kids discipline, work ethic, mental toughness, and grit. We take what kids already do and give it structure.

CCHS Wrestling

The Cumberland County Wrestling Jets exceeded expectations again this season. The team has grown from 3 wrestlers to 24 within a span of 2 years. This has been a work in progress that has resulted in back to back region championships in the 182 pound division by Junior Greyson Hale, and six state qualifiers: Jakob Hicks (285sr.), Ty Raimbeau (220so.), Grayson Hale (182jr.), Marcus Pedde (160so.), Will Bastian (153so.), and James Lawson (138fr.).
