## **CCHD TO HOLD DRIVE-THRU FLU CLINICS**

The Central Connecticut Health District (CCHD) encourages all Connecticut residents to get their annual flu shot. Due to Covid-19 concerns, CCHD will be hosting eight DRIVE THRU flu clinics during the month of October in our four district towns of Berlin, Newington, Rocky Hill, and Wethersfield. A "Drive-Thru" clinic means that it is held at a location where those participating <u>remain within their vehicles</u> while being screened and vaccinated by the same process as a regular walk in clinic. (Pediatric drive-thru vaccination stations will also be made available for children 4-18 years of age and their family members. This area will have space for children to receive their shot outside of the car.) Drive-thru clinics are especially important this year to contain the spread of Covid-19.

Influenza (flu) is a highly contagious viral respiratory infection affecting the nose, throat, and lungs that can cause mild to severe illnesses **potentially** resulting in hospitalization and can lead to death. In the United States, the CDC estimates that influenza has resulted in between 9.2 million and 35.6 million illnesses, between 140,000 and 710,000 hospitalizations and between 12,000 and 56,000 deaths **annually** since 2010. Symptoms include fever, cough, sore throat, muscle/body aches, runny/stuffy nose, headache, and fatigue. Complications include viral and bacterial pneumonia, ear and/or sinus infections, and worsening of existing chronic medical conditions.

The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) recommends annual flu vaccinations for everyone 6 months of age and older, especially among at-risk populations with compromised (weakened) immune systems. Vulnerable populations susceptible to prolonged infection and influenza-related complications include adults over 65 years of age, children under five, pregnant women, and persons with chronic medical conditions such as asthma, lung disease (chronic obstructive pulmonary disease & emphysema), heart disease (congestive heart failure & coronary artery disease), and diabetes.

Annual flu vaccination is the primary method to provide immunity against the influenza virus, lessening illness and death caused by influenza-related complications. Please keep in mind that both influenza and Covid-19 viruses cause respiratory illness. Co-infection is possible, thus, it is even more important to get a <u>flu</u> vaccination since preventing or minimizing flu, may help to diagnose Covid-19 infection more easily. Once a Covid-19 vaccine is available, these same drive-thru clinics will most likely be run again for vaccination against Covid-19.

\*<u>FDA approved</u> quadrivalent formulation for the U.S. 2020-2021's egg-based influenza vaccine provides coverage for the following four strains: A/Guangdong-Maonan/SWL1536/2019 (H1N1) pdm09-like virus; A/HongKong/2671/2019 (H3N2)-like virus; B/Washington/02/2019- like virus (B/Victoria lineage); and B/Phuket/3073/2013-like virus (B/Yamagata lineage). Cell or recombinant based influenza vaccines provide coverage for: A/Hawaii/70/2019 (H1N1) pdm09-like virus; A/HongKong/45/2019 (H3N2)-like virus; B/Washington/02/2019- like virus (B/Victoria lineage); and B/Phuket/3073/2013-like virus (B/Yamagata lineage).

Please bring your insurance card to the clinic to receive your vaccination at no cost to you. (A photocopy of your card will speed up the process). We bill Aetna, Anthem, CIGNA Healthcare, Connecticare, **Harvard Pilgrim**, United Healthcare Medicare plans, and Medicare part B insurances.
