Gateway Sets New Hours In Response To COVID-19

For the safety of our children, families and employees during the continuing COVID-19 (coronavirus) situation, Gateway Community Action Partnership offices, outreach centers and facilities will be closed on Mondays and Fridays beginning Friday, March 20 with employees working from home to abide by social distancing protocols on those days.

Gateway offices, outreach centers and facilities will be open during normal business hours (8:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m.) on Tuesdays, Wednesdays and Thursdays to provide services while operating with reduced staffing to comply with required crowd sizes limits of less than 50 people in one site.

This schedule will remain in effect until the agency is notified by state and federal officials that it is safe and prudent to resume the normal, five-day work week.

Gateway will notify colleagues, constituents, clients and community members when the return to the normal work schedule is deemed appropriate.

Gateway's services open during the mid-week include Social Services, Weatherization and Literacy Volunteers. Administrative services will be available on-site as well. Gateway Community Action Partnership: March 2020 News

Gateway Women, Infants & Children (WIC) staff will work Monday through Friday from 8:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. and provide phone certifications, per State WIC office directive.

Gateway Home Energy Assistance Program (LIHEAP) in Cumberland, Gloucester and Salem will be open on Tuesdays (8:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m.), Wednesdays (1 to 6 p.m.) and Thursdays (8:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m.). Our Vineland Outreach Office will be closed.

Gateway Family Success Centers in Bridgeton, Millville and Salem will likewise, be open on Tuesdays, Wednesdays and Thursdays.

Gateway's Spring Gardens Senior Housing will maintain limited visitation requirements. The Alzheimer's & Adult Day Care Program will be closed to outside clients and remain closed until the COVID-19 restrictions are lifted at the state and federal levels.

Gateway's Head Start/Early Head Start Program closed all centers effective Tuesday, March 17. Centers will be closed for a period of two weeks, through Tuesday, March 31.

Head Start administrative and family support services will be available to families during this time period. Head Start staff will check in with families on a regular basis during the closure.



Jinnea Terrell Is Living Gateway's Mission Of Improving Lives, Promoting Self-Sufficiency

We all would like to be the best parent(s) we can be to our children. That feeling really hits you once you have them. When I gave birth to my two sons Zyon and Amari (who are 2 years apart) I had that innate feeling to be the best mom I could be. I knew it was going to be tough after splitting from their dad and going through a bad break up. I always questioned myself "Could I still be a good parent and give my children the best life in a single parent home?" That worried me for so long. When they were babies, I did go through the welfare

program and utilized every assistance that the government offered to help me to get where I needed to be. I was left alone to raise these two boys by myself and I just did not know how I was going to do it.

One day I was in a pizzeria and I saw a flyer for the Head Start program. I knew I wanted to go back to school and work, so I needed a school for my boys. I eventually enrolled my sons in the Head Start program. My youngest son faced some tough developmental milestones and he did not speak until he was 3 ½ years of age. He was enrolled in the Head Start program at age 3 and was receiving school services as well. I believe these two programs, early intervention, and myself really help stimulate his speech (now he is full talk and laughter he is such a jokester).

Both of my kids went through the program and completed successfully. My family advocate saw strengths in me. I was always questioning the boys' development. I kept pondering what else I could do to help them grow and be the best they could be. My family advocate (Danelle Ransome) invited me to the parent meetings and eventually I was nominated for policy council, where I served as secretary, vice president, and president. Head Start helped me with making sure I knew how to raise my kids. This included proper discipline, health, dental health, social and emotional development and academics. I also served on Gateway's Board of Directors. They showed me how to be a leader and an advocate for my children so much, so I have attended every IEP meeting my child has had and created some suggestions and advocated for him. I have made every single parent teacher conference for both boys. I ended up being Vice President of the PTO in our school district. Even though my children completed the Head Start program, I still stayed with Head Start and served because I knew I had something to offer and I knew they had something to offer to me. I was eager and open to being a good parent and not let my challenges define me.

Over the years of me serving I was able to go back to school and complete my degrees. I was working at a behavioral facility that was closing so I decided to apply for a position here with Head Start right after I completed my master's degree in Human Service with counseling focus. I got the position and moved up to another position. I love helping and motivating my family advocates and parents. I love making people smile and laugh.

I could not have done this without people encouraging and supporting me. The family advocate, some managers, Head Start Vice President Bonnie Eggenburg, and Mr. Edward Bethea, Gateway's Executive Vice President and COO, have constantly supported me and encouraged me and now I get to support and encourage hundreds of families and staff I supervise and offer them hope through my story. Bonnie has always allowed me to be exposed to conferences, workshops, and seminars that would develop me better as a parent and person. She always keeps her door open whenever I have a question or need guidance.

I have had many obstacles in my life that could have completely knocked me down, like having cancer that I beat. I thank God for his direction. Fast forward to now I am a year into my PhD program in Psychology with an emphasis on Organizational/Industrial Development, graduation is in 2022. I am not on any government assistance programs and I have been able to be more self-sufficient. My children are now 13 and soon to be 11. They are doing really good in school. I am so proud of them and their academics. They are both are athletes they play fall football and travel spring football, and they wrestle. Life has not been easy by far but Head Start and some of the people there helped me set the tone and fulfill the direction I wanted to go in and my children and they will always be a big part of my story and my success. Gateway Head Start truly works if you allow it to!!!

Internet Essentials, a program offered by Comcast, gives income-eligible families access to the Internet for \$9.95 a month with no activation fee, equipment fees or price increases. Having the Internet enables children to do homework, type reports or do research and enables the parents to e-mail teachers as well as look for jobs, pay bills or find doctors. Gateway Community Action Partnership is working with Comcast to inform families of the program. To be eligible, low-income applicants need to show they are participating in one or more of a dozen different federal assistance programs, including Medicaid, SNAP, and SSI. They must reside in a Comcast service area and must not have subscribed to Comcast Internet in the last 90 days or have overdue Comcast bills. Also, low-cost computers are being offered for \$149.99 and free training is accessible if needed. Gateway operates the **Special** Supplemental Nutrition Program for Women, Infants & Children (WIC) in Camden, Cape May, Cumberland, Atlantic and Salem counties. The program provides supplemental foods, nutrition education, lactation support, immunization education and health care referrals to income-eligible pregnant women, new mothers, infants and children up to age 5. Gateway WIC serves more than 23,000 clients annually through flexible hours through its eight (8) offices and a full-service, health screening mobile office. WIC is an equal opportunity program.
