

## **OFFICIAL MINUTES**

of the **PUBLIC HEARING/REGULAR MEETING** of the Greenwich Township Board of Education held **Monday, March 28, 2011** in the Nehaunsey Middle School library.

The meeting was called to order by Vice-President Loraine LaPalomanto at 7:01 p.m.

## **FLAG SALUTE**

### **1. MOTION TO OPEN PUBLIC HEARING ON THE 2011-2012 SCHOOL BUDGET**

Motion: (LaPalomanto/Murschell) to open the public hearing portion of the meeting to present the 2011-2012 proposed budget.

- A. The 2011-2012 Budget Presentation was made by Scott A. Campbell, School Business Administrator. (Presentation attached)
- B. Discussion open to the public.

**Lee Lucas, 361 Democrat Road, Gibbstown, NJ** asked why the medical costs went up 20%? **Scott Campbell** replied that they are **projected** to go up 20% and it is because we were locked into an 18-month agreement that expires

bid in June and we could either stay with the same company or put it out to see if we can beat that rate.

**Cheryl Pindur, 113 South Orchard Street, Gibbstown, NJ** asked why we have to cut back so much? Why haven't we cut back on field trips and extracurricular activities like other states and school districts have done? **Mr. Tarantino** replied that starting in the 2011-2012 school year, the Board of Education has agreed to pay for the transportation of all field trips but the cost for admissions will now be passed onto the parents. Also the clubs for the elementary school, with the exception of the music program, have been eliminated. The middle school clubs will stay with a few modifications. **Mrs. Pindur** then asked about a note that went home with the students about selecting either Italian or Spanish and why wasn't that given to all taxpayers? **Mr. Tarantino** responded that it is in the early stages right now and it will be up to the Board of Education to make that decision if they want to send that out to the taxpayers. **Mrs. Pindur** asked why was there a question about which language to choose? **Mr. Tarantino** replied that in K-8, there are two different foreign languages that are taught and the direction we are going in the elementary school, is the elimination of a foreign language position. The foreign language will then be infused into the curriculum. **Mrs. Pindur** asked, "how"? **Mr. Tarantino** asked **Mrs. Pindur** to call him in the morning and he will be more than happy to discuss it with her. **Mrs. Pindur** stated that in this day and age all the other countries in the world are teaching English, French, Spanish, German and other languages. Here we finally get a language at the elementary school level where it is needed and where the kids really pick up on it and it is being eliminated. **Mr. Tarantino** stated that as far as he was concerned, the children really need more basics and less foreign language. He added that if you look at the direction that the county is taking, it is a luxury to have a foreign language in the elementary school and many districts have already done away with it. **Mrs. Pindur** then asked when we were going back to one school? **Mrs. Pindur** asked if it will happen by next year or the year after? **Loraine LaPalomente** replied that we are working on that but since she is not the chairperson of the Building Committee any longer she will have Jason Murschell, who is the chairperson, respond to that. **Jason Murschell** then stated that it is up to the architects that we picked to come up with the right plan that is going to suit the districts educational needs for the children. The architect is going to sit down with the educational staff to see what our needs may be and that is going to take some time. **Mrs. LaPalomente** added that we were moving along but she was downgraded from the chairperson position to just a committee member. With Mr. Murschell periodically away serving our country, she had asked our Board President if Lisa Morina could join our team to talk to the architects to get some more information from them and at that time the Board President decided that we did not need Mrs. Morina on our committee to continue on the movement in the right direction. **Mrs. LaPalomente** then added that she brought the election of the architect to the

board at that time so we can continue forward. We did elect an architect that we felt could do the job that we needed to have done and we were going to negotiate some costs. The other architect that we interviewed that was not chosen had four lawsuits against them and one even with the Paulsboro School district so we didn't want that architect. At that time, "I was then downgraded to just a committee member" and Jason Murschell was put on as Chairperson because we brought that to the election. **Ms. LaPalomento** made a statement that she and Mrs. Morina were at the senior citizens meeting and Louis Fabiani brought up the fact that the new architect that we chose was going to cost us \$30 million. **Ms. LaPalomento** would like to know where Mr. Fabiani got that figure? **Mr. Fabiani** replied that he never said that. He said preliminary estimates show it to be around the \$20 million range. **Ms. LaPalomento** emphatically stated that it was an incorrect figure and we never talked to the architect about costs. She would like Mr. Fabiani to know that he is still a board member and still under the "code of ethics" and he can't go out and misrepresent the board with false facts.

**Chuck Tortella**, 414 Swedesboro Road, Gibbstown, NJ stated that with the current budget that is being proposed, it does include some cuts in instruction and personel. He wanted to know if there are any other projected cuts that we don't know about? **Mr. Tarantino** replied that there are none that he is aware of. **Mr. Tarantino** also stated that some of the cuts we made are because of the decrease in anticipated enrollment and right now we don't know what the final figures are for Kindergarten. If we get more kids in Kindergarten that would warrant a third teacher, then one of our teachers would not be let go. **Mr. Tarantino** explained the scenario: The Media Specialist will be retiring. So the new teacher that is hired will be the Media Specialist/Technology Specialty/Gifted & Talented teacher. The position presently at the elementary school will be transferred to the middle school. The person that was recently hired at the middle school will be let go. There is a possibility of one other position being eliminated but he would have to speak with the board about it. **Mr. Tortella** then asked about the cafeteria and if the decision to privatize was a good economic move? **Scott Campbell** replied that it was and added that the cafeteria had been running in the deficit and now they are operating well. There have been no complaints about the quality of food, the prices and so forth. **Mr. Tortella** asked that when the budget went through last year, was the decision on the cafeteria already made? **Mr. Campbell** responded that it was not. It was something the board decided that the incoming board would make the final decision after the election.

**Paul Morlachetta**, 17 Holly Place, Gibbstown, NJ stated that as he understood it during the brief conversation, as of yet, the board has no architect. **Loraine LaPalomento** replied that we do have an architect. **Mr. Morlachetta** then stated that there was no salary attached to that so called architect. And if that is correct, then candidates or people representing the school board shouldn't be

quoting figures out to the general public if they aren't actually bonafide by the board. That should be made public.

**Terry DiSanto**, School Psychologist, stated that during Mr. Campbell's presentation of cost saving measures, it is important for the parents to know that in addition to the loss of three staff members, we will also have a decrease in the delivery of some of our special area subjects such as foreign language and computer/library and all extra-curricular activities at the elementary school.

**Vince Tarantino** added, "with the exception of the music program."

**Lori Bass-Riley**, 612 Betty Rose Avenue, Gibbstown, NJ wanted to clarify several things. She asked if the library will now be combined with computers and will the media/technology/gifted & talented person be handling all that? **Vince Tarantino** replied, "correct". **Mrs. Bass-Riley** then asked if the children will have any learning as to how to look up books in the library to which **Mr. Tarantino** replied, "correct". She then asked if this will be done all in one period; the period they would spend at computers and again **Mr. Tarantino** replied, "correct". Her concern is that how will they learn the basics of computers and the basics of library usage? **Mr. Tarantino** responded that we will have a librarian (which is the Media Specialist) that will also teach technology while teaching library skills. He also added that it is only one period per week. **Mrs. Bass-Riley** asked if the computers will be in the library? **Mr. Tarantino** replied that they could be or the teacher will take the students down to the computer lab. **Mrs. Bass-Riley** asked how many positions will be lost? **Mr. Tarantino** replied that the Gifted & Talented/Technology teacher will be moved to the middle school and replace someone there. We also have a reduction-in-force at the first grade level. We have two Kindergarten classes going into three first grade classes so unless we get an increase in the Kindergarten enrollment, we will have to let one teacher go at the first grade level. Should there be a large Kindergarten enrollment, then that teacher will move to the Kindergarten level. He added that there will also be a foreign language teacher that will be eliminated. **Mrs. Bass-Riley** asked how the foreign language will be "infused" into the curriculum and will the teachers have special education since they are not foreign language specialists? **Mr. Tarantino** responded that they will have a plan for that.

**Sharon Gomez-Salvatore**, 122 Bacchus Avenue, Gibbstown, NJ made a statement about the foreign language in our schools. She stated that the language programs helps students maintain and receive jobs because they were able to be bi-lingual. Her son is an engineer and he was able to get that job because he was fluent in Spanish. His friend, who is also an engineer and came through Greenwich Township School was able to get her job because she was fluent in Spanish starting from elementary school through high school and into college. She added that being bi-lingual will certainly help our students in the future. Infusing it into the curriculum will make it really difficult for the teachers and the students. She also added, "when we are trying to make our students

maintain their level of intensity in the job world, it would certainly benefit them to be bi-lingual.” So in closing, she feels that infusing doesn’t always work and the district should be careful about doing that. **Vince Tarantino** asked Mrs. Salvatore when was the last time she was in a Kindergarten or first grade classroom. **Mrs. Salvatore** replied, “about ten years ago and that’s where I learned that it didn’t work.”

**Lee Lucas** said that he agrees that there should be no foreign language in Kindergarten through eighth grade and that the kids have plenty of time in grades 9-12 to learn it. He added that people that come to this country should learn English. **Mr. Lucas** then asked why the changes were made on the committees? **Lisa Morina** replied that the Board President was not here to answer that question. **Mr. Lucas** asked why the President was not present at the meeting? **Louis Fabiani** responded that Mr. Worrell was having a medical procedure done.

**Joann Parker**, 110 Mellon Avenue, Gibbstown, NJ wanted to applaud Mrs. Gomez-Salvatore stating that she spoke beautifully and she agrees with her. She also stated that she heard that there is a vote going around as to what language will be taught. **Vince Tarantino** replied, “correct”, to which **Ms. Parker** responded, “that’s just wrong.” She added that anything that is taught in this school should be based on research as to what is the best for our students here, in high school, college and out in the world.

**Vince Lombardo**, Harmony Road, Gibbstown, NJ thanked the board for saying the pledge of allegiance but wanted to know what “Acknowledgement of God and Country” meant? **Mr. Tarantino** replied that it was something that is put on the agenda and the prayer is up to the prerogative of the President or Vice-President.

**Martin Ware**, 706 Lock Avenue, Gibbstown, NJ questioned if there was a curriculum counsel set up? **Mr. Tarantino** replied that there is a curriculum committee. **Mr. Ware** explained that his daughter brought home a survey and she was really bothered by it and he wanted to know whose idea it was to send those home with the students? **Mr. Tarantino** replied that it was his idea and it was meant for the parents to read and make suggestions to the board. **Mr. Ware** stated that his daughter didn’t want to vote on it because she didn’t want to see anyone lose their job. He also wanted to know that if the decision is made to go to one building, is the board going to have to float a bond in order to get the money to pay for it to which **Mr. Tarantino** responded, “yes”. **Mr. Ware** then asked why wasn’t the decision made to consolidate when the state was going to give us some money? **Mr. Tarantino** replied that there is still money out there and available and that is why the Board of Education is considering consolidation. **Susan Vernacchio** stated that there was a task force that researched all the possibilities and they came back to the board with their

suggestions. All the proper procedures were followed. **Louis Fabiani** stated that in 2004, the board came up with the referendum to expand Nehaunsey Middle School and the voters turned it down twice but with the enrollment being down in the last six years, the board is looking to consolidate again. He went on to say that the board interviewed architects for the job and one group was significantly lower than the other group. **Lisa Morina** interjected and said to Mr. Fabiani that on February 15, the board had chosen an architect and that while she respects Mr. Fabiani's decision, he voted no for that architect. **Mr. Ware** then asked about the NJQSAC and how our scores were? **Mr. Tarantino** replied that the board is appealing one section right now and he will give the board and the public a full report at the next board meeting held on April 11, 2011.

**Mark Montemore**, Broad Street, Gibbstown, NJ stated that if Mr. Fabiani's misrepresentation of the architect was wrong, then why can't the board get the figures out to everyone? **Loraine LaPalomente** replied that with Jason **Murschell** now being the chairperson on that committee, we will be having a meeting and will get those figures out to the public. **Lisa Morina** then stated to Mr. Montemore that the board has chosen an architect. They did not choose a price, a school or a design. They chose an architect that they felt they could work with. **Mr. Montemore** then asked about the lawsuits that were brought on to the other architect that the board had not chosen and if those lawsuits were resolved to which **Ms. LaPalomente** answered that the information was out there to the public.

**Chuck Tortella** wanted the public to know that this part of the discussion is supposed to be about the budget and the discussions going on now should be done at the next public portion of the meeting.

**Paul Morlachetta** commented that the general public should be knowledgeable about the fact that the issue between these two buildings is that Broad Street School looks better; that is the whole issue. The process of the education of our children has never been discussed. The only issue is that they have a beautiful stone façade on Broad Street. The senior citizens of this town in particular are saying that they went to school there so let's leave it that way. The school board has to determine what is best for the students and not a brick façade.

**Jane Hare**, 301 Memorial Avenue, Gibbstown, NJ said she has been offended several times by being told that she is attached to the school. She didn't go there and she is not attached to it. She read in the paper that it's a sentimental liking for the school and she is tired of hearing that and being accused of being sentimental to the Broad Street School. She also stated that the architect that presented those plans said it was built like a bomb shelter.

**Lisa Monte**, 651 Pieta Place, Gibbstown, NJ stated that she wants to show her support for the full time foreign language program as referenced by Mrs. Salvatore and Ms. Parker.

**Christine Nastasi**, 721 Allen Avenue, Gibbstown, NJ said she heard from the presentation that the tax rate is going down so she doesn't understand why the board is cutting the foreign language program. She stated that it isn't fair to say that Spanish is a luxury. **Vince Tarantino** responded that our Kindergarten through fourth-grade students spend 80 minutes a week in Spanish and more emphasis should be placed on the basics, not learning a second language. **Mrs. Nastasi** said that now when the students get to middle school, they are learning "uno, dos, tres", when they should be learning that in Kindergarten. **Mr. Tarantino** countered with the fact that there are many schools in the district and the State of New Jersey that do not have a foreign language in the elementary school; they infuse it into the curriculum and the students are still learning a foreign language. **Mrs. Nastasi** asked if there are studies on that and **Mr. Tarantino** replied that there are. He also feels that the children need more basics then they do a foreign language. **Mrs. Nastasi** then asked why give them more basics if some of the children don't need it? **Mr. Tarantino** responded that it is his job to make that determination and he feels they need more basics and he also said this isn't about money; it is the way we deliver instruction. The teachers will now have 120 minutes more of instruction with the students which will include one period a week where they will take their students to the library and computer class.

**Kathleen DiBella**, 37 North Orchard Street, Gibbstown, NJ asked if there was a decrease in test scores? **Mr. Tarantino** replied that there hasn't been at this point. **Mrs. DiBella** then asked what he was basing his opinion on to say that the children need more basics and how is he evaluating that? **Mr. Tarantino** responded that he was looking at the future.
