Dear Parishioners,

Last week, I wrote a little about the importance of the funeral Mass and to having Masses offered for the deceased. This week, I would like to focus on the importance of how we treat the bodies of the deceased. After death, our funeral directors prepare the bodies not only for viewing (we sometimes need to see the deceased to say good bye), but also for burial. Almost every funeral director and their staff I have had the honor of working with see their duties as a sacred ministry that they provide to aid in the grief process. They provide a much-needed service in the time of need and loss. I am thankful to have worked with excellent directors in our area.

Even if the body is to be cremated, the body is treated with profound respect. While the Church allows for cremation, the preferred is that we would have the body for the funeral Mass, and then cremation. The remains of cremation, while not the body, are still to be treated with respect, though not honored with a pall at the funeral Mass as that is reserved for the body.

The Church prefers body burial because this more beautifully displays our hope in the resurrection. In the resurrection, our bodies and souls are reunited and transformed into bodies that are made for eternity. We do not simply bury our departed because we need to do something. We bury the bodies as a sign of hope in the resurrection. In most Catholic cemeteries, we bury the bodies so that when they will 'sit up' in the resurrection, they will be facing the East, the direction of the rising sun, from which we believe Christ will come. Regarding cremations, the Church asks not to have the remains scattered or even divided (where family members take some of the ashes). The remains should be buried or placed in a columbarium (a structure made for the inurnment of the remains).

This week, I would like to publicly thank through these notes all who have a part in the upkeep of our cemeteries. Their upkeep is one way of honoring our dearly departed, and the hard work of maintaining the grass, monuments, and other things is often neglected until those that do the work 'neglect' to do it. Thank you to all. Also, I want to thank the record keepers, especially Caren and Dan, for their work in selling and marking graves.

Both have recently requested to resign from this, and I have failed to fill the position. If you are good at keeping records, reading maps, and feel that you could give some time to helping those either preparing for their burial or the burial of a loved one, let me know. It would involve going to the cemetery to locate the grave for sale, marking it for 'opening' for burial, assisting in marking the locations of new monuments, and keeping accurate record of sales and burial.

JESUS' TEACHING ON PRAYER

Jesus taught, "When you pray, do not be like the hypocrites, for they love to pray standing in the synagogues and on the street corners to be seen by men ... but when you pray, go into your room, close the door and pray to your father who is unseen."

Matthew 6:5-8

Jesus began his teaching on prayer here by saying how not to pray:

- 1. Don't show off. Synagogues were places of worship where many people gathered to pray. Jesus spoke against those who prayed loudly just so they could be seen and praised by others. He called such people hypocrites.
- Don't use a lot of meaningless words. The Gentiles'
 prayers were long because they thought this would
 impress their many gods. Often, they repeated a
 phrase or a god's name many times, hoping to
 attract attention.

Jesus said that prayer should be a private time between God and the worshipper. Jesus does not mean that it is wrong to pray with others, but the prayers should be sincere and for the right motives.

This past week the church celebrated All Saints Day and All Souls Day. It is a reminder that the promise of eternal life exists and that our death only separates us physically. God continues to reveal Himself to us in extraordinary and miraculous ways, and even better – He shows us how to participate in it when we live our lives in faith, hope, love, joy, and utilize the power of prayer. What we need to remember, though, is that prayer does not change God – *it changes US*.
